MAINE WOMEN'S LOBBY

LEGISLATIVE SESSION

We celebrated key wins including funding for the paid leave commission and the childcare workforce, laws that will support LGBTQ+ people (like more consistency in the domestic partner's laws and Maine Human Rights Act, as well as letting people change their names without public notice),

initiatives that will help Maine defeat hunger, and laws that will protect workers from harassment. We're so grateful to all the sponsors that carried out this work.

ELECTION SEASON

We know that we can move the needle by helping more feminists and gender-justice advocates

be leaders in their communities, to educate candidates on the issues, and to energize their neighbors and community members to make noise for change.

Our election season kicked off at **Broadturn Farm** in Scarborough, with our community coming together to support and celebrate gender equity champions in policy change.

Throughout September, we hosted the **Election Action Institute**, a series of trainings focused on building the skills for civic engagement and relational organizing. Community members learned tools to connect with their neighbors and to vote for gender justice.

We also worked throughout election season with a powerful group of 30 rural leaders in Hancock, Lincoln, and Aroostook Counties to engage with new voters and get people to the polls. Members of the Rural Leadership Cohort assisted us in Lincoln County for our first ever candidate canvas! We

knocked on over two hundred doors together to get out the 'care vote'. We are here to say in the halls of power that **care** work counts.





SUPPORT CANDIDATES WHO SUPPORT CARE.

Without care work, other work grinds to a halt. We spread the word that care systems and policies were on the ballot because

we need elected representatives who recognize that care work is work. Recognizing and compensating care work is one of the most powerful ways to advance gender equity in Maine. For us, this means building care systems, like paid family and medical leave and more flexible and affordable childcare; supporting care workers, a workforce that is underpaid and undervalued due to the racism and sexism in the roots of this system; and recognizing the links between caregiving and reproductive justice, because people must be able to choose when and how to grow one's family.

PAID FAMILY & MEDICAL LEAVE


Maine people should be able to put family first without sacrificing their job and financial security.

The Maine Paid Leave Coalition, which we coordinate, increased to 35 member organizations representing tens of thousands of Mainers. We organized hard to ensure that the bill for PFML would be in the Legislature in 2023.

But we know that might not be enough. That's why we teamed up with Maine People's Alliance to pursue a ballot initiative. Together, we collected 50,000 signatures on Election Day alone, and had more than 80,000 signatures to submit.

Whether we pass a bill for paid leave or push through a ballot, we know we can't wait to make care work count.



YOUTH POLICY LEADERSHIP FORUM

We were thrilled to launch the new Youth Policy Leadership Forum! After a quarter-century of success, Girls' Day at the Statehouse expanded to include a high school cohort, which will track the legislative process in real time through the session, from the moment legislators register bill titles to the final budget process.

We were so proud celebrate 26 years of this program in September and highlight the power of Girls Day at the Blaine House, Maine's Governor's mansion, surrounded by program alumni, volunteers, legislators, supporters and champions, and Governor Mills.

Our programs continue to build a cohort of **young people from every county in Maine** who are invested in gender-equitable civic engagement and social change on a local, statewide, and national level. In 2023, we expect to be working with over 150 youth to make the policy process more transparent, connect them with each other as valuable resources, and equip our participants with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to take on change in their corners of Maine.

THE END OF ROE V. WADE

During the 2022 summer of rage and the fall of Roe v. Wade, Americans saw terrifying abortion laws go up in multiple states. We came together many times in Maine and in national conversations to affirm and assess Maine's own protections on abortion. We also connected reproductive justice with our Get Out the Vote (GOTV) efforts, like the Fall of the Patriarchy mini festival in Portland at Lincoln Park, with our partners in reproductive health advocacy.

Throughout this work, we collaborated with Maine Family Planning, Grandmother's for Reproductive Rights, Planned

Parenthood of Northern New England, and other supportive ally organizations for community support and education through screenings, panels, and rallies throughout the summer.

COURTS MATTER



We used the nomination of Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson as an opportunity to build




